## CA CS Framework Overview

A community school is any school serving pre-Kindergarten through high school students through a “whole-child” approach, with an integrated focus on academics, health and social services, youth and

community development, and community engagement. It is an equity-driven and assets-building school transformation program.

Adopted in 2022, the CA CS Framework identifies 4 Pillars of Community Schools, Key Conditions for Learning, Cornerstone Commitments, and Proven Practices as follows:

**Pillars of Community Schools:** Integrated Student Supports; Family and Community Engagement; Collaborative Leadership and Practices for Educators and Administrators and; Extended Learning Time and Opportunities

**Key Conditions for Learning in a Community School:** Supportive environmental conditions that foster strong relationships and community; Productive instructional strategies that support motivation, competence, and self-directed learning; Social and emotional learning (SEL) that fosters skills, habits, and mindsets that enable academic progress, efficacy, and productive behavior, and; System of supports that enable healthy development, respond to student needs, and address learning barriers.

**Cornerstone Commitments of Community Schools:** A commitment to assets-driven and strength-based practice; A commitment to racially just and restorative school climates; A commitment to powerful, culturally proficient, and relevant instruction; and a commitment to shared decision making and participatory practices.

**Proven Practices of Community Schools:** Community Asset Mapping and Gap Analysis; A Community School Coordinator; Site-Based and LEA-Based Advisory Councils, and Integrating and Aligning with Other Relevant Programs.

Describe the developmental plans for ensuring these values are reflected in your community schools work:

Pedley Elementary School is committed to supporting the 4 main pillars of practice of the California Community School Partnership Program (CCSPP).

Pedley continues to focus on being asset-driven and strengths-based. We currently have 741 students enrolled on our campus. 77.1% of our students fall under the category of socioeconomically disadvantaged. 42.8% of our students are English Language Learners. Our Foster Youth currently makes up 0.8% of our student population. At Pedley Elementary, we recognize that the voices, ideas, and needs of all stakeholders—students, families, staff, and community members—are essential in shaping programs, services, and events that truly reflect and serve our community. We value the unique backgrounds and experiences of our school community and are committed to building and sustaining strong partnerships with parents, teachers, families, local businesses, community organizations, and the district to support the success and well-being of every student. Pedley is proud to support our students through the Dual Immersion Program, serving bilingual students. Our instructional practices promote language development, academic success, and cultural appreciation. Additionally, Pedley Elementary is committed to providing specialized support for students enrolled in our TK-6th grade Functional Skills, Special Education program, and promoting inclusive practices on campus.

To increase parent and family participation in district/school surveys, Pedley will offer ongoing support opportunities for completing electronic surveys throughout the school year. This includes providing assistance at school events and ensuring access to interpretation, translation, and technology for those who need it. Additionally, with the support of the Parent and Teachers Organization (PTO), Pedley has recruited parents and community members to share their talents, support their businesses, and assist in building a stronger sense of community. Through understanding community-expressed needs, Pedley intends to continue to offer programs like Family Literacy & Math Trainings, Focused Monthly Meetings with the Principal (academic support, testing questions, at-home strategies, behavior), Family Engagement Opportunities, Parent Trainings, PTO, and 6th Grade Booster Club. Pedley will continue to build upon leadership development opportunities for students, educators, families, and community members that are inclusive and assist with growing their capacity within a leadership role on campus.

Pedley teachers are working towards having all staff trained in Restorative Practices to support the school site with this practice. Restorative practices are needed to support racially just, culturally responsive, and relationship-centered school climates. We are evolving in this practice. In addition to the already district-mandated two-day restorative practices certification training for all administrators, Pedley will encourage classified staff and teachers to attend Restorative Practices training to help continue fostering a culture of welcome, belonging, and understanding at school. The goal is to focus on restorative approaches to building relationships and discipline to create positive school environments.

Additionally, teachers will continue to receive targeted training on addressing the needs of marginalized student groups (i.e., English Language Learners, restorative practices, trauma-informed learning, social/emotional learning, behavior support, students with disabilities). Furthermore, with the support from the district, Pedley has identified the need for affinity groups to address the specific needs of students (i.e., African American students, Students with Disabilities, and Newcomers). The goal is to create safe spaces for various student groups and their families to feel seen and heard. According to the results of the parent LCAP survey, 11.6% of parents feel that their child does not feel safe at school.

PBIS/Attendance Team - Chronic Absenteeism is an identified area of need at our school site. At Pedley Elementary, the Community Schools TSA (Teacher on Special Assignment) plays an active and collaborative role on the PBIS/Attendance Team, working alongside site administrators, teachers, classified staff, parents, community partners, and the district MTSS team. Together, we are focused on removing barriers to learning, addressing chronic absenteeism, and fostering a positive, inclusive school culture where every student feels a strong sense of belonging. The TSA helps coordinate efforts that strengthen attendance through family engagement, support services, and community partnerships. This includes parent training to address barriers that may contribute to low attendance, and assisting with finding resources as needed to support families with increased attendance. The TSA and certificated/classified staff will attend trainings/conferences that are aligned with efforts to reduce chronic absenteeism. In addition, opportunities

for expanded learning opportunities will be provided at Saturday School to increase student participation and make up for absences where students have missed out on learning time.

In addition, as a SEL coordinator/member of the PBIS team, the Community Schools TSA helps lead the development and implementation of strategies aligned with Social Emotional Learning (SEL), PBIS, and restorative practices. These systems are designed to support Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS), ensuring that all students receive the tools and care they need to thrive. This includes acting in the role of facilitator for Tier 2 interventions, such as CICO (Check In/Check Out), facilitating community/restorative circles, and providing opportunities for staff professional development in the area of behavior support and SEL practices. This work also includes organizing parent training opportunities to deepen understanding of student needs, improve campus-wide attendance and behavior, and strengthen the connection between home and school. Year 2 goals include modeling and facilitating community circles in 75% of the classrooms on campus, with a goal of increasing the number of teachers and students utilizing the community and restorative circles. The TSA also supports hands-on initiatives like the STAR Store, attendance incentive programs, and school-wide events that promote a culture of celebration, care, and community. The TSA will also facilitate Wellness Wednesdays and Feel Good Fridays, incorporating SEL lessons into schoolwide routines. Parent workshops in the areas of SEL and Mental Health will be organized in collaboration with community partners.

Pedley Elementary demonstrates a commitment towards our school and district vision through programs such as:

**Extended Learning Opportunities (ELO)** - After school programs to provide instruction in the areas of homework support and/or academic support to students. Classroom teachers and/or community partners will offer extended learning opportunities to support students who would benefit from support in these areas. The TSA will work to coordinate and expand structured student engagement during unstructured times on campus (e.g., recess/lunch) based on site needs.

**Expanded and Enriched Learning Opportunities** - At Pedley Elementary, we are committed to expanding student learning beyond the traditional classroom through meaningful enrichment opportunities that spark curiosity, build real-world skills, and nurture a sense of belonging. These experiences are thoughtfully designed to deepen student engagement and expose them to diverse pathways of learning. Our enrichment offerings include, but are not limited to, STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math), social-emotional learning, visual and performing arts, arts and crafts, intramural sports, and the Elevo Sports program during recess, lunch, PE, and structured play. These opportunities come to life through engaging classes, clubs, hands-on activities, and interactive presentations. Certificated staff, classified staff, and community partners would assist with the planning and implementation of these expanded learning opportunities. In addition, the TSA would work to support increasing awareness of self-regulation and coping strategies, reinforce area expectations, and reduce disciplinary referrals through restorative practices.

**Student Peer Leadership/PAL** - The Peer Assistance Leadership (PAL) program is a student-driven, school-based initiative designed to empower youth in grades 4–12 to support one another through leadership, connection, and compassion. Rooted in the belief that students can be powerful agents of change, PAL cultivates peer-to-peer mentorship and fosters a school culture that is caring, inclusive, and safe for all. At Pedley Elementary, the Community Schools TSA will work to actively support and fund leadership training opportunities for participating student leaders, including transportation to off-site training events. In addition, Community Schools is committed to building long-term sustainability for the PAL program by offering leadership development for school staff—ensuring a strong foundation for this impactful work to continue and grow. Additional leadership opportunities will be developed to support student engagement and school improvement.

**Wellness Wednesdays & Feel Good Fridays** - Pedley Elementary will host Wellness Days to provide students with meaningful opportunities to explore Social Emotional Learning (SEL) in supportive, engaging

ways. During these open sessions, students will participate in activities designed to nurture both mind and body, strengthen positive coping strategies, and build trusting relationships with peers and adults. Wellness Days will be facilitated by the Community Schools TSA, with a focus on implementing SEL lessons/strategies and creating a sense of belonging within the school setting. Through hands-on experiences, calming spaces, and intentional practices, students will develop tools to manage emotions, reduce stress, and feel more connected to their school community. To enhance these experiences, materials and supplies will be provided to promote high engagement and cultivate a positive, school-wide culture that embraces wellness and emotional growth. 29.8% of our parents indicated that family stress is a concern. 21.9% of our parents surveyed feel that anxiety and mental health of students are a factor that makes school success difficult for their child.

**Family Nights** - Pedley Elementary is committed to fostering strong family and community partnerships through engaging events such as Family Math Night, Family Literacy Night, Game Nights, Library Events, and Family STEAM Nights. These after-school events are designed to strengthen connections between home and school, increase access to curriculum, and support student learning through hands-on, interactive experiences. Parents, families, and community partners are invited to participate in either whole school or grade-level lessons/activities led by teachers or classified staff in areas such as math, English Language Arts, science, technology, engineering, arts, and crafts. These events provide opportunities for collaborative leadership among educators and administrators, extended learning time for students, and an opportunity for families to engage directly in their children's education on the Pedley campus. In addition, it helps to build relationships among all school partners. To ensure meaningful participation, supplies are purchased and provided, and certificated and/or classified staff support implementation by assisting in classrooms, supervising activities, translating, and assistance as needed—all with the goal of creating welcoming, inclusive spaces that promote student success and community connection.

All initiatives are driven by our SPSA data and are intentionally designed to close achievement gaps, with a focus on supporting Students with Disabilities, English Learners, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged Students and other identified groups with demonstrated needs.

Pedley has established a Community Schools Council and provides bylaws. The meetings occur four times yearly, and the council provides feedback on the Implementation Plan.

## Strategy 2: Collective Priorities: Setting Goals and Taking Action (The Needs and Assets Assessment )

Jurupa Unified School District (JUSD) and Pedley Elementary utilize various general and specific tools to collect data at the site level and identify needs.

### Surveys:

**Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP)** - This survey is administered to students, parents, school staff, teachers, and educational partners to help inform and guide the development of the Single School Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA). LCAP surveys are administered annually. The Pedley Elementary Community Schools TSA actively supported LCAP survey administration through visibility to families before and after school, and through booths set up at on-site community events.

**Panorama Education** - Pedley administers the Panorama Education Survey twice a year to students in grades 3 through 6 in the fall and the spring. The survey measures student support and environment and student competency and well-being. The data is utilized to guide programming, support students, and build a positive school culture. In addition, the Panorama platform links student attendance data, school performance, behavior, ELL classification, and SEL data to provide multi-tiered data results to guide site goals and identify areas of need.

**The California Healthy Kids Survey (CHKS)** - This anonymous and confidential survey collects data regarding school climate, safety, student wellness, and youth resiliency. It is administered to students in 6th grade. It enables our school to collect and analyze data regarding local youth health risks and behaviors, school connectedness, school climate, protective factors, and school violence.

**Community Schools Needs Assessment** - This needs assessment is administered to Staff, Families, & Students. This survey provided valuable feedback to identify the needs of our Pedley school community. Parent, Student, and Staff input helped to guide programs, supports, resources, and training for our school community to meet identified areas of need. Student input assisted with guiding expanded learning opportunities on campus.

Additionally, Community Schools Cohort 3 has conducted opportunities to facilitate open-ended conversations within community conversations and forums to further guide understanding of the needs within our community school. Based on the needs identified in the surveys, in addition to feedback from all community stakeholders, Pedley Elementary will work towards supporting the shared vision of our school, through implementing programs, site activities, parent and staff training, and opportunities for community and family engagement on campus.

**Site Committees/Community Forums:** School Site Council (SSC), English Language Advisory Council (ELAC), Special Education Parent Advisory Committee (SEPAC), Gifted and Talented Education (GATE), Community Schools Council (CSC, ) and the School Site Leadership Team, provide administration and the Community Schools TSA with valuable information and feedback regarding their concerns and/or suggestions regarding topics such as school safety, teacher preparedness, parent needs, technology needs, etc. The data and information gathered within those groups help inform the development of the SPSA.

**Committees that assist in providing input on student and community needs:**

**Community Schools Cohort 3 Committee:** C.S. Cohort 3 will continue to meet monthly, in person, to collaborate across sites, develop Action Plans, and review and analyze needs assessment results with the understanding that data drives future planning. The group serves as an opportunity to collaborate across sites, share best practices, and ensure that each community school is equipped to meet the unique needs of its students and families.

**Community Schools of Practice:** Community Schools of Practice will meet monthly to collaborate with the Coordinator, TSA's, and Principals to review data and make course pathways regularly.

**Attendance Team:** Pedley Attendance Team members' goal is to engage and support the community members in removing barriers and addressing needs to support student attendance and decrease chronic absenteeism. The team comprises classified staff, teachers, MTSS, administrators, and parents. The California Dashboard shows our site Chronic Absenteeism currently falls in the Yellow for all students on campus.

**Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) Team:** Pedley has established a PBIS team to develop and implement systems of support that will assist in creating a culture of welcome for students and staff. The goal of this team will be to create a strong-tiered system of support that will address the behavioral, social, and emotional needs of Pedley students.

The Attendance/PBIS Team will meet together to collaborate and identify shared areas of support. This is part of a MTSS area of practice to target identified areas of need and reduce barriers that contribute to chronic absenteeism. This team meets regularly throughout the year to review student needs, identify barriers, and coordinate intervention supports & services. According to the LCAP parent survey results, 20.7% of parents felt that they were not aware of resources and support services available to their students at school.

**Site Leadership Team:** The leadership team at Pedley Elementary plays an important role in supporting

school-wide goals and opportunities for collaboration among staff members. According to the Staff results of the LCAP Survey, 81.1% of staff felt that the site principal kept them informed about their site/department and aware of information that impacts their work. The site leadership team is made up of a representative from each grade level, as well as site administration and the Community Schools TSA. The team meets regularly to discuss curriculum, student needs, and plans for school improvement. These team members serve as liaisons for their grade level teams and administration. In addition, these representatives share best practices, and ensure that all staff are aware of important information on campus.

**Additional Supports:** Based on the identified school needs, Family Literacy Meetings/Parent Trainings will be provided each month. The goal is to establish and support a family reading routine. This will include offering hands-on training and support for families provided by site administration and/or certificated staff. This will also include providing materials that the families can use at home to support literacy growth and development, such as books, handouts, and access to online programs to support reading skills at home. The program is designed to be an educational process that encourages critical reflection and dialogue through literacy and strengthens parent-child interactions.

**PAL:** The Community School TSA was trained in the PAL program in Spring 2025. The TSA will work to implement this program on the Pedley Elementary campus. The PAL Peer Assistance Leadership Program is a school-based, peer-to-peer youth development program for students in grades 4-12 built upon a philosophy of students helping students. PAL peer leaders help build a positive school climate through youth leadership, mentoring, conflict resolution, cross-age teaching, peer helping, service learning, and prevention activities. This program will integrate a Peer Mediator program to encourage and empower students with the skills and strategies for dealing with conflict. It will also help students develop communication and decision-making tools that influence choices in the future and increase leadership potential.

**Student Council:** Student council plays a role in our school community by encouraging student leadership, promoting student voice and opinion, and facilitating active participation in school decision-making. Student Council helps to support a sense of belonging within the school setting, and identifies student needs on campus. According to the CS Student Needs Assessment (Spring 2025), only 12.8% of students feel that their opinions and ideas are heard on campus. The Community School TSA will support student leadership through community partnerships and expanded learning opportunities, such as field trips and training for staff & students involved. Opportunities for development/training in the area of student leadership will be provided for staff involved with running Student Council as needed.

**Parent Involvement:** Pedley is committed to increasing family engagement through parent involvement functions such as Family Nights, including but not limited to Math Nights to support understanding of math strategies and concepts, Literacy Night for Parents to support parent reading instruction and understanding of literacy support strategies, Family Game Nights, Open Library times, Family Picnics, 100 miles club family runs, Performing Arts performances, Winter Concerts, and School Carnivals. In addition, Parent Trainings will be offered and will cover a variety of topics, such as technology, internet safety/social media awareness, mental health, academic supports, behavior supports, and mental health. The Community Schools TSA will continue to provide support, training, and resources for teachers, parents and students as identified through surveys and family requests.

The ELO Extended Learning Opportunities program was established to support our families whose children need help with reading and math skills.

**W.A.T.C.H D.O.G.S:** Curriculum has been ordered/purchased and will begin to be implemented in the 25/26 school year. This is a program to encourage more families to participate in their children's education. This program will allow family members to serve as role models for Pedley students,

demonstrating with their presence that education is important.

**Neighborhood Healthcare:** Pedley has also established connections with Neighborhood Healthcare. We have been working with Neighborhood Healthcare to expand school-based dental services using a mobile unit to provide service to students. Community Health Systems will also have a mobile unit to help support services. Healthy Jurupa is a local collaborative of nonprofit and governmental agencies that is a resource for our school site.

The Newcomers Extended Learning class will offer extra support and an opportunity to learn basic interpersonal English skills to recently arrived immigrants to our school community before/after school.

**Community Partner Engagement:** The TSA will support Community Partner engagement on a regular basis as part of building Strategic Community Partnerships. This includes working in collaboration with Riverside County Office of Education (RCOE) and other surrounding school districts that have a shared understanding and commitment towards building up community schools. The TSA will work to form shared community partnerships as needs are identified through surveys or conversations with shareholders. This includes attending meetings held at Reach Out to build on future partnerships, attending the Family Engagement Network(FEN) meetings at RCOE, attending community school workshops/conferences, and developing new areas of collaboration within the surrounding community.

**Community Events with Community Resource Booths:** Community Resource booths are an additional opportunity for resource awareness. Several community partnerships have set up tables during school events to inform the community about valuable and free resources.

**Restorative Practices:** Pedley Administrators and Teachers have been trained in Restorative Practices and have implemented Restorative Circles to build community and enhance conversation in focus groups amongst students to navigate conflict or disagreements. The Pedley Community Schools TSA will continue to support Community Circles and Restorative Practices through modeling and training of additional staff members. Additionally, the AP and Principal has been trained in trauma-informed for marginalized students and families to help support homeless, newcomer, and foster children in the classrooms.

**Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST):** ASIST is a two-day, two-trainer workshop that emphasizes teaching suicide first-aid to help a person at risk stay safe and seek further help as needed. Participants learn to use a suicide intervention model to identify persons with thoughts of suicide, seek a shared understanding of reasons for dying and living, develop a safe plan based upon a review of risk, be prepared to do follow-up and become involved in suicide-safer community networks. Pedley now has 2 ASIST trained employees who could provide an immediate risk assessment if needed.

This ongoing community engagement supports the development of new relationships providing services at Pedley. As a result, our Parent Involvement and Community Outreach, PICO, department has a community resource guide available to all sites. (<https://jurupausd.org/our-district/ps/pico/Pages/Resources.aspx>).

The Community Schools Advisory Council at Pedley consists of teachers from the school site, parents/family members, Assistant Principal and Principal. Pedley’s Advisory Council engages the community through the lens of the community school pillars to support alignment with the community school's implementation plans and the site Single Plan for Student Achievement. The Community Schools committee meetings are open to all families and staff members within our school community. The Community Schools Teacher on Special Assignment at Pedley will hold a position on this council and will be responsible for scheduling council meetings, as well as facilitating opportunities for ongoing community and family engagement at the school site. The Community Schools TSA will also be responsible for helping to inform the development and sustainability of community schools. The National Education Association further supports our community school teams through Jurupa’s participation in the NEA Community School Institute. This council will conduct an annual needs assessment utilizing our Panorama Survey, Community Schools Needs Tools, LCAP, and focus groups, with site-based parent groups and site leadership to inform and support updating the implementation plan, which will be posted online.

Describe the plans or steps you are considering to build sustainability beyond the life of your implementation grant:

Jurupa Unified School District - JUSD is currently working on the sustainability of integrated services through a variety of leveraged funding sources and partnerships. These include:

1. Expanding its current contract with Riverside University Health System - Behavioral Health under EPSDT billing. The goal is for any Behavioral Health Staff funded by community schools to shift to EPSDT funding. We have already seen an increase in our contract with previous grant funding.
  - a. Medical services are now reimbursable for case management services.
2. Co-located substance abuse treatment and prevention programs provided by Riverside University Health System - Behavioral Health.

Jurupa Unified plans to explore the following funding streams:

3. Managed Care Plans. With Medical and mental health reform at the state level, there is momentum for school districts to become contract providers of managed care plans.
4. Private Insurance: We currently have plans to submit a proposal to Kaiser Permanente to become an approved provider for mental health services. This is pending JUSD employing a sufficient number of Licensed Therapists and being able to meet the needs of its existing Medi-Cal-based and uninsured referrals. Community school funding would accelerate this work by increasing the mental health workforce to meet current needs.
5. Mental Health Pathways: Currently, in partnership with Riverside County Office of Education, Moreno Valley Unified School District, Beaumont School District, and Cal Baptist University, we are planning to establish dual enrollment in the field of social work / mental health. This Federal School-Based grant funding will support pathways to social work / mental health and provide paid internship opportunities. This aligns with the internally developed Student Support Services Action Plan

Pedley has collaborated with RUHS Riverside University Health System, Healthy Jurupa Collaborative, The Riverside County Family Resource Network, Strengthening Families MFI Marriage and Family Institute, Reach Out, Community Health and Wellness, Staff leadership have sat on the County Behavioral Health, Commission, JARPD Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District, Wiley Center (Triple P), Training Occupational Development Educating Community, Seeking Strength, Neighborhood Healthcare Dental, Kaiser Theatre Student Wellness Foundation (Password), Set 4 School (Dino School/Incredible Years), and other services organizations which have helped build a true network to serve our communities and to collaborate to address current needs. Below is a brief list of organizations/contracts which allow us to provide services. All these relationships have been built over time through our committed involvement. - Riverside University Health System - Behavioral Health:
  - System of Care / EPSDT: Our current specialty mental health contract reimburses Jurupa Unified for services rendered. Staffing includes clinicians, a parent partner, and peer specialists for Transitional Aged Youth (TAY).
  - Substance Abuse Prevention & Treatment (SAPT): We plan to integrate and co-locate Riverside County Staff members into wellness centers at our secondary schools to provide onsite Substance Use and Prevention Treatment. Community schools Cohort 1 planned for the use of Wellness Centers. The first one was put into operation this first year, and the second one is set for construction with match dollars over the summer. We plan to expand Wellness Centers to Cohort 2 schools if funded.
  - Mental Health Service Act / Prevention and Early Intervention: Suicide Prevention Training is provided annually for JUSD staff.
  - Mental Health Service Act / Prevention and Early Intervention: CBITS or Cognitive Behavioral Intervention for Trauma in Schools is funded for JUSD staff to provide These services are in our schools for grades 6-9.
- MFI - Marriage & Family Institute: is a mental health and substance treatment agency. We

provide referrals to. MFI provides parent outreach and education regarding substance use prevention.

- Vision Y Compromiso provides *promotoras* (Community Health Workers) to provide parent education and support through various programs. Vision Y Compromiso is a lead grassroots organization based out of Los Angeles that has expanded to the Inland Empire with funding from the Mental Health Service Act and the Mexican Consulate to provide culturally relevant engagement of our communities and families.
- Cal Baptist University provides mental health graduate interns and is a lead partner of the School-Based Mental Health initiative. Their role is to provide a pathway utilizing dual enrollment and paid internships for our school district to hire and retain mental health professionals.
- Community Health Systems Federally Qualified Health Center provides both a medical mobile unit and integrated mental health supports.
- Neighborhood Health Federally Qualified Health Center provides a dental mobile unit across all campuses and screens our Head Start / Preschool students.
- First 5 Riverside contracts JUSD as one of the region's largest home visitation providers and a Riverside County Family Resource Center member.
- Alma Family Services is an EPSDT provider co-located at JUSD's Children & Family Services location and provides school-based EPSDT mental health services.
- Wylie Center provides parenting classes
- America's Best Eyeglasses allows JUSD's PICO office to provide four monthly referrals for free vision exams and eyeglasses.
- Youth Enrichment Services provides regular donations of backpacks, school supplies, new clothes, and hygiene kits for JUSD to provide students access by school staff.
