The Nut Butter Battle by Kaitlynn Chavez

With almond butter's rising shelf space in grocery stores, many have been curious of the new and commonly organic product and how it stands to the traditional school lunch and pantry staple of peanut butter. On the surface the two seem identical, carbs, protein, and fat (the Macronutrients) all only grams off from one another. In terms of micronutrients though Almond Butter takes complete advantage over PB with double

amount of magnesium and iron, triple amounts of the antioxidant vitamin E and four times the amount of calcium.

Currently sitting comfortably while sharing a shelf with peanut butter, almond butter can be intimidating especially for first time tasters and consistent buyers. Almond butter can cost up to \$13.00 for the same size or smaller jar of peanut butter but what most don't realize is that that jar of almond butter consists usually of only one ingredient: dry-roasted, unsalted almonds.

To make homemade almond

butter, directions are as follows: Using a food processor and an "S" blade, pulse and process until nuts enter transitioning stages of chopped, crumbly, finely ground and finally creamy. Keep in mind the almonds will warm while processing and you will likely need to stop and scrape down the sides. Keep in my mind the state of your processor as it will need to run awhile so give it a couple of breaks as needed. This will ultimately help make your almond butter creamier as the oils are released.

When your fresh batch is done feel free to add salt, spice, or honey depending on your personal taste.

Important College Application Dates:

- CSU and UC priority application deadline for fall 2016 admission is 11/30/2015
- SAT— Oct. 3 scores available 10/22/15 online
- Nov 7. SAT—late registration last day is 10/27 (the late fee is \$28)
- Last available SAT for Fall 2016 applications is Dec. 5. Register w/o late fee by Nov. 5.
- There is only one remaining test date for the ACT for Fall 2016 applications. This test date is Dec. 12; register w/o paying a late fee by Nov. 6

Important College Info Especially for SENIORS by Kaitlynn Chavez

Most 4 year colleges require students to submit SAT or ACT scores. These tests must be taken no later than December.

The SAT has three major sections: math, reading and writing (this includes a written essay)

The ACT has four major sections: English, math, reading and science (and an OPTIONAL essay section).

The ACT without essay totals \$39.50 and with the essay is \$56.50. The SAT test totals \$54.50. Prep books for these tests are available in the office. Sign up for the SAT at sat.collegeboard.org and the ACT at actstudent.org. For those who qualify, fee waivers are available for the SAT and the ACT (up to 2 each).

The SAT also has 20 SAT Subject Tests available in five general subject areas: English, history, languages, math and science. Some colleges will grant exemption from or credit for a freshman course requirement if a student does well on a specific SAT Subject Test. What you are considering as a major can help you to decide what test(s) are best for you.

CSU and UC priority. The CSU application fee is \$55 and the UC application fee is \$70 per school. Fee waivers are available to those who qualify (this pays the fee for up to four UC campuses and four CSU campuses of your choosing). If you are filing the CSU admission application through CSU Mentor (sign up at csumentor.edu) your fee waiver re-

quest is included in the process. UC applications are filled out through the UC Admissions website: admission.universityofcalifornia.edu and the fee waiver application is also included online.

Most other four year schools use the Common Application; to find out the application deadline for these schools sign up online for the common application at commonapp.org.
