What is a School Social Worker / Outreach Worker?

School Social Workers provide services that enhance and promote the educational, emotional, and social needs of students and families in order for them to make use of the resources available to them to achieve their full potential within their home, school, and community.

Challenges in the lives of students can include:

- School attendance issues and truancy
- Abuse, neglect and dependency
- Trauma, grief and loss
- Poverty and homelessness
- Family conflict
- Domestic violence
- Developmental delays
- Teen pregnancy and parenting needs

Social Work Intern Level 1:

These are students in their final year of a Bachelors in Social Work Program. BSW interns support our First Steps program and learn case management services towards the second half of their intern program.

Social Work Intern Level II:

These are students in their first year of an MSW intern program.

Social Work Intern Level III:

These are students in their second year of an MSW program or in an MSW advanced standing program.

What do School Social Workers do?

School Social Workers locate and utilize resources in the family, school and community to help students succeed in school by:

- Addressing problems that threaten students' safety and well-being.
- Encouraging self-esteem, self-discipline and conflict resolution.
- Encouraging healthy lifestyles and healthy relationships.
- Assisting students with quality of life, and personal success.
- Supporting families with attendance issues.
- Identifying and providing resources



School Social Workers encourage families to:

- Participate in school activities, programs, plans, and conferences.
- Resolve problems that interfere with child safety and well-being.
- Meet physical, social and emotional needs.
- Provide age-appropriate supervision and discipline.
- Utilize school and community resources to meet their child's needs.
- Encourage long-term plans for their child's future, quality of life, employment and personal success.

What Programs are available?



Parent Child Home Visitation (PCHP) A family partner visits

twice a week modeling and coaching parents on positive verbal interaction with their child. Books and toys are introduced throughout the program to encourage parent and child interaction.

Services are provided by a Social Work Intern Level II.

First Steps: Is a home visitation program which aligns with the Developmental Milestones of infants 0-12 months to support families. The home visitation program includes up to 7 visits with a Family Partner who provides resources and referrals.

Services are provided by a Social Work Intern Level 1.

Macro Concentration:

Our department takes a systems approach working with county agencies and elected officials to link services with families in our community. We have worked to expand agency funding and service to our area as well as connect multiple agencies towards a common goal. We work directly with FIRST 5 Riverside, DPSS, HOPE Collaborative (Child Abuse Prevention Council) DPSS Family Resource Centers, Riverside County office of Education, Riverside University Health Systems (Public Health and Behavioral Health), and the offices of Congressman Takano, Assemblymember Cervantes, and Senator Roth. Macro students will work with our partners and this includes weekend and evening events.


